How Science Gets Corrupted

I recently came across a social media post by a person who was obviously a Bible believing Christian. This person was questioning the naturalistic evolutionary science perspective about the dating of ancient artifacts. It got my curiosity up, so I asked AI to analyze it to see if what this person wrote was accurate.

What I got back was an explanation that was biased toward a naturalistic worldview. That bothered me for two reasons. First, because this particular AI was touted to have a Christian bias built in. And second because Naturalism is a faith point of view and I was looking for an answer based on solid science. In the past, I have written a number of articles and blogs questioning the use of naturalistic presuppositions when trying to legitimate scientific conclusions. It seems that the AI program fell right into false presupposition trap.

When I got its response, I replied to the AI by questioning its methodology, and asked it to reconsider taking into account the distinction between actual science and naturalistic philosophy. I thought you might be interested to see how this conversation played out.

Immediately below is the social media post I asked the AI to analyze. Following that is its answer. After its answer, you will see my response and AI's follow-up response.

Is this accurate? [My question to AI about the following social media post.]

Are you familiar with the "London hammer?" It is an odd relic that most people never heard of because the "science" behind its carbon dating has become so controver-

sial. Don't be confused by the title of the hammer, because it was found in London, Texas, not in England. I will try to provide a brief history of the find so that you might better understand some of the controversy.

In 1936, a man named Max Hahn and his wife were walking along Red Creek near London, Texas, when they found a piece of wood protruding from a rock, so they picked it up and carried it home. It remained in their home as a conversation piece for years, and about ten years later, the couple's son decided to break the rock open to look inside. After doing that, he found that the stone contained an iron hammerhead, with a portion of the wooden handle still attached. The hammer appeared to be of modern origin, so the family began to wonder how it became embedded in the hardened natural formation. Also, within the same rock was a modern sea shell, which was not fossilized.

Besides that, many archeologists claim that mankind supposedly did not appear on earth until about 200,000 years ago. The rock was analyzed again in another laboratory, through careful Carbon 14 dating processes, and the "well established science" indicated that it was only about 250 million years old. Since then, numerous other people have studied the artifact and their opinions have mostly ranged somewhere

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between those two dates, with a variance of a few hundred million years.

The iron hammer itself was cautiously studied, in addition to the condition of the intact wood, and it was determined to be of a relatively recent time, and could not have been any older than about 700 years. One specialist stated that the hammer style was commonly used from about 1850, into the more modern era. Many of the people who studied the object agreed that the hammer would have been required to be compressed inside the stone contents under great pressure over a vast amount of time, and they found it odd that the exposed wooden portion of it was not deformed and had not fossilized.

It was certainly an enigma, and no one has found any way of explaining how a relatively modern tool could be completely encased in such a seemingly prehistoric rock, especially with the wood and the sea shell still intact. Of course, there is no evidence of any volcanic activity in the hammer's case, it was simply found along the edge of a Texas creek. But it was certainly embedded in the rock formation, and current evidence provides that fact.

So, the next time you hear that an object, or a fossil, or a bone is X millions

of years old, you can have some assurance that the estimation probably contains a lot of scientific chicanery. There is another subject that I won't go into right now, but paleontologists have more recently discovered collagen (soft fiber) in some of the dinosaur bone evidence, which would have unquestionably decayed long before now, if they were as old as they have previously been estimated.

Also, if you ever have an opportunity to visit the state park at Glen Rose, Texas, go down to the riverbed and observe the tracks of a dinosaur alongside and adjacent to human footprints, which are preserved in the same limestone level of the creek bottom. Many scientists from all over the world will declare that it is impossible for that to occur because those two specimens lived many millions of years apart. Of course, I have been there and have witnessed the tracks, so I can verify the evidence of them. In years past, there were many videos available online, which confirmed this information, but for "some strange reason" many of them have been removed by unknown sources.

Dr. Carl Baugh and his staff have studied those findings for many years, and much of the video from the Creation Evidence Museum is still currently available. Yeah, I can already hear the evolutionists screaming from here, because there is no end to some of their blindness of the truth.

The default sources this AI program searched were based on the work of people who are convinced Naturalists. Thus, there is a built in bias that naturalistic beliefs are true, and the answers that resulted reflected that. This is in spite of the fact that the AI program I used for this search was one written by a Christian for Christians. This does not mean that the program creator has a bias toward Naturalism, but rather that it still uses the same internet that other AI programs use, and the top search results tend to be sources that are most commonly accepted in academia – which is highly biased in favor of naturalistic philosophy.

When I questioned its sources, however, it dug deeper to get at the problems I pointed out. When I pointed out the bias problem, it searched in different places to take into account the biases I identified.

The truth is, when it comes to the field of evolutionary science, we are dealing more with philosophy than science. People working in this field try to use the scientific method to do their work, but the problem is that they do it already having decided their conclusion in advance. They are convinced naturalistic evolution is true, and their “scientific efforts” don’t use observation and experimentation to discover the truth. Rather, they lay out their conclusion in advance and attempt to come up with various explanations to try and prove their predetermined beliefs. That simply is not science.

AI programs are actually fantastic tools for doing research. But as you use it, you need to be aware of the built in biases of the programs you are using. You also need to be aware that sometimes AI either makes things up or simply makes mistakes (by using inaccurate sources). Always check your work!

You also need to recognize that AI cannot give you definitive answers on faith matters. Knowing God is not a mechanical process, it is personal. We can find out a lot of information from AI, but knowing God requires personally entering into a relationship with Him.

In the case of this search, AI followed the reasoning of evolutionary scientists and came up with conclusions that fit their presuppositions – in spite of the fact that those conclusions were derived philosophically rather than scientifically. And while this is a problem AI reports, the actual problem lies with the “scientists” that write the reports that AI reads.

The natural universe is all that is believed to exist by evolutionary scientists who believe naturalistic philosophy, and their underlying belief taints their research. The truth is, there is a part of reality that exists beyond the natural. Those who know God know that.

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
